
Standardized Patient Program in Dr. Mahoney's Application of the OT Process with Older Adults I Class


The standardized patient program was conducted in **Dr. Mahoney's** AOP OA I class, where students interacted with a standardized patient, focusing on active listening, safety precautions, and adaptability during treatment sessions.

- Students had the chance to observe one another through technology, allowing them to learn from each other's experiences.
- They also participated in a three-part debrief session to reflect on their interactions with the patient and to consider how they will apply the lessons learned to their future clinical work.


Two of our MSOT '26 students, **Mikey Kamano and Heather Falconer,** shared their thoughts on the experience, **Mikey** stating, "The standardized patient program was a great opportunity to gain hands-on experience in a controlled, safe environment. Especially before fieldwork, this program provides safe variability in the entire treatment process and encourages students to think outside the box when things inevitably go wrong!" and **Heather** stating "The thought of everyone watching me "treat" a patient when I had no clue what to expect really scared me! The reality is, in the future when I walk into a patient's room, I won't know what to expect. This experience gave me the opportunity to dip my toes in, prepare an activity, teach a patient how to use adaptive equipment, and practice my patient-interaction skills all in a controlled environment. For that I am extremely grateful."



Rehabilitation Research Day

The Programs in Occupational Therapy showcased impressive representation at the 2025 Columbia University Rehabilitation Research Day Conference, with faculty, students, alumni, and colleagues presenting groundbreaking research. We had faculty members, **Dr. Precin, Dr. Geller, Dr. Mendonca, and Dr. Simon** attend and present. We also had CUOT Alumni, **Lindsey Steckler and Irene Savrides**, who delivered insightful presentations such as the "Effectiveness of Training on the Trauma Informed Approach Amongst School-Based Occupational Therapists" and "Impact of a Multifactorial Approach on Falls Reduction, Function and Self-efficacy in Community Based Older Adults" that highlighted the innovative approaches being undertaken in the field. The conference served as an excellent platform for exchanging ideas and fostering collaborations among professionals dedicated to advancing rehabilitation science. Attendees were particularly impressed by the diverse range of topics covered, from cutting-edge assistive technologies to novel therapeutic strategies. The event was a testament to the vibrant academic and research community at Columbia, showcasing the commitment to improving patient outcomes through rigorous research and practical application.

The Curiosity Cube Event brought together over 1,280 students from five public elementary schools in Washington Heights at Haven Plaza, Columbia University Irving Medical Center. The event was a vibrant celebration of curiosity and learning, where students were immersed in a world of discovery and innovation.

Why I chose OT:


I was born with a rare visual impairment, Optic Nerve Hypoplasia. Starting from a young age, I had my own variety of early intervention services, including occupational therapy. After early intervention, I continued with a vision therapy itinerant teacher throughout my schooling who provided me with support and accommodations. When exploring college majors, I knew nursing or being a doctor would be difficult with my disability, I didn't think I wanted to be a teacher, and I was trying to find the right fit for me. While exploring the major tables at an open house at a local college, I found the occupational therapy table, did not remember I had even received these services at the age of three, but by the end of their speech, I was hooked. Continuing my career as a school-based OT has brought my experience full circle, as now I am the team member providing support for my students on the other side of the IEP team.

CUOT Highlights:

- Assistive Technology and Modifications Lab Assistant
 - Columbia University OT has offered me an incredible number of opportunities throughout my time in their program. Hometown: Moca, Dominican Republic Why I chose OT?:

As an undergraduate student, I was determined to work towards becoming a medical doctor. It was a dream that was passed down from my family, and while a beautiful one, I began to feel that it wasn't the right fit for me. I wanted a career where I could really spend time with my clients. I began to research the rehabilitation professions, and at first, I was focused on exploring physical therapy since I was already familiar with it. While I continued my research, I remembered seeing an OT session at NYP's rehabilitation unit during a rotation I completed as part of a youth program affiliated with the hospital. I immediately began to research occupational therapy. I fell in love with the functional, activity-based approach that occupational therapy employs. I was also fascinated by the number of practice areas within OT that I could explore and potentially specialize in.

CUOT Highlights:

One of my highlights at CUOT was the holiday gatherings, birthday parties, and engagement celebrations I had the opportunity to spend with my classmates. These events broke up the monotony of sitting in classrooms and allowed me to connect with both peers and staff. I was also fortunate enough to build friendships with many peers in the classes before and after my own. These connections made my experience at CUOT that much more memorable.

The physical disability labs were something that I grew to enjoy. They gave us a chance to build practical skills and apply what we were learning in the classroom, while also creating opportunities for some very funny moments. Another classroom experience I enjoyed was building adaptive devices out of cardboard. I found that the project allowed me to find a balance between understanding good clinical reasoning and utilizing creativity to solve problems. Although challenging, it was rewarding to know that the work of my team was helping a child to meet their school needs.

Brief Bio:

My name is Enmanuel Bencosme. I was born in the Dominican Republic in the little province of Moca. I arrived in Washington Heights at the age of 9 and grew up in the neighborhood with my parents and my two older siblings. My siblings and I are the children of deaf adults (CoDAs). I grew up learning Spanish and Dominican Sign Language as my first languages and slowly developed my English through English as a Second Language (ESL) classes through my first few years of education in the US. At the same time, my family began to learn American Sign Language (ASL), which I admittedly still struggle with. Some of the things I love include Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu, rock climbing, calisthenics, learning the guitar, poetry, and being in nature. I find meaning in my Christian faith and learning about others' experiences.

Currently, I am working as a mental health occupational therapist at the New York State Psychiatric Institute. In this role, I provide trauma-informed therapy groups that explore areas such as living skills, self-care, dialectical behavioral therapy (DBT) skills, effective interpersonal skills, self-esteem, and musical expression. In individual sessions, I work with patients to develop pre-vocational skills and resources. I am also pursuing my OTD degree, conducting research on the implementation of competency-based education (CBE) into level 1 fieldwork experiences, under the mentorship of Dr. Michael Urban.
